



COVID-19 Vaccine Progress: Local Public Health Districts

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- Vaccine is being administered to Priority Groups established by CVAC & Governor
- Providers continue to enroll, which will help increase throughput as more vaccine becomes available
- Most enrolled providers are willing to vaccinate all Priority Groups
- Mass clinics are underway (or planned) in majority of health districts
- Health Districts coordinating with and assisting other enrolled providers
- Strategies in place to reach rural communities
- Using community partners, Medical Reserve Corps volunteers, Idaho National Guard to assist with clinics



- Providing information through call centers, websites, traditional media, social media
- Providing option for notification when Priority Groups are eligible to receive vaccine
- Facilitating appointment scheduling
 - Directly scheduling patients via phone or online
 - Directly connecting patients to providers
 - Publishing provider lists/info
- PrepMod not widely used; many providers using their own Electronic Health Record software for scheduling



- Transitioning from smaller target groups to larger populations; ask for the public's patience while vaccines doses are extremely limited
- Very limited vaccine supply; current allocations are far below the demand and capacity
 - Priority Group 2.2 (Individuals aged 65+) = 290,670
 - Current Weekly Vaccine Allocation = 20,925
 - Approximately 10 weeks to complete this Priority Group
- Data Entry/Reporting
 - Lag time between CDC reporting of vaccine allocation until received by local providers
 - Lag time between vaccine dose administered and reported
 - New enrolled providers (IRIS data entry, EMR interface)
